# **Drawbacks of All-Nighters, Cramming**

A study led by Andrew J. Fuligni, professor of psychiatry at the Semel Institute for Neuroscience and Human Behavior at UCLA, showing that cramming for tests and not sleeping enough had a negative effect on high school students' academic performance was highlighted today by the Toronto Globe & Mail and Wednesday by Asian News International, Education Week, Britain's Daily Mail, KNBC-Channel 4, KTLA-Channel 5, Chicago's WFLD-TV, Tampa Bay's WFLA-TV, Minneapolis' KSTP-TV, Detroit's WJBK-TV and Seattle's KCPQ-TV.
